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A Look Back at 25 Years of GRASSROOTS



In 1991 the seeds of GRASSROOTS were first sown in Luton, inspired by founder David Cowling, and supported by the Methodist Church and Christian Aid. From the beginning a ground-breaking Christian programme of community engagement, GRASSROOTS' ecumenical work soon grew and flourished, with other Christian denominations, organisations and trusts offering their support and involvement. In those early days, GRASSROOTS was a resource for churches, helping them relate to a world undergoing rapid cultural, social, political and religious change, including here, in Britain.

Initially, GRASSROOTS invited Mission Partners from different parts of the world, bringing fresh and exciting insights as to how churches could engage with the changing cultural and religious face of Britain. Over time, this work expanded, leading to the formation of the Luton Council of Faiths, plus a variety of innovative, imaginative and cutting-edge community projects. Against a background of recent tensions in Luton, triggered by local, national and international dynamics, and further provoked by a number of extremist groups, GRASSROOTS has been at the fore in promoting inter cultural and religious awareness, and as such is held in high regard in Luton and beyond. Whilst the future remains both unpredictable and uncertain, GRASSROOTS can draw on the strength and confidence of its past achievements, its continuing vision for human flourishing, and a commitment to furthering the mission of God in Luton, as it continues to develop its work and to make a positive difference for the whole diversity of people it encounters.

GRASSROOTS is deeply indebted to all those individuals, churches, organisations and funders who have endorsed and supported GRASSROOTS over the past 25 years - they are too numerous to mention, but without their support much of what has been achieved would not have been possible. We are also hugely grateful to those who have been generous in their support of our anniversary celebration. To all attending the celebration evening, our sincere thanks, and we very much hope that you will catch something of the passion, commitment and energy which is the life blood of GRASSROOTS. 'For all that has been – thanks! To all that will be – yes!'

In so doing, it has been both a presence and a companion, remaining organic, and maintaining its ability to respond creatively to the issues emerging from time to time.

As a Christian ecumenical programme of community engagement, in dialogue with churches and other faith communities, GRASSROOTS strives to uncover a sharp edge of engagement with contemporary issues of community cohesion, peace and reconciliation, injustice and inequality, in Luton's diverse context. As we mark 25 years of successful working, it is fitting to acknowledge the support and encouragement received from the Churches and from our Trustees, and the efforts of my everenthusiastic, passion-driven staff team. Furthermore, GRASSROOTS could not survive without the commitment and support of its partners and many volunteers. 'May we all continue to help GRASSROOTS light candles rather than to curse the darkness!'



Grassroots
...a different point of view

Let GRASSROOTS remain a 'programme' of community engagement and community coherence and not become an organisation or an institution where structural legalities and survival can take priority over people's well-being.

Words of Wisdom from David Cowling





David Cowling could rightly be regarded pioneer. An energetic vet as unassuming man, his personal warmth, vision and capacity to uplift empower those around him helped establish **GRASSROOTS** as the organisation it is today. Having served as a missionary in Kenya, David strongly believed in the liberation of the poor, the oppressed and the suffering. Without compromise, he dared to dream of a 'mission alternative', which led to the creation of GRASSROOTS. He saw in the story of Jesus the liberation of human beings, and he lived that out fully in his work overseas and back in Luton.

Through GRASSROOTS, David sought to listen to and echo the voices of the marginalised, challenging the Church to become a more effective agent for change. His vision was vast, seeking to integrate community development, education, partnership, mission, justice and spirituality.

During the early days of GRASSROOTS, David called for greater attention to be placed on social justice - beyond notions simply of charity - recognising that this was necessary to challenge the root causes of poverty and suffering. He invited Mission Partners from all over the world to share lessons, experiences and witness with each other. David's vision was transformative, proudly identifying that 'mission' is not ours, but that we are to be engaged in Gods mission - a mission to bring peace, justice and life in all its fullness to all God's people everywhere.

David sought to offer hope in a world where hope, at times, was lost, inspiring those around him to work together for the better. As he often taught, "the magnitude of the darkness should never deter anyone from lighting one candle; indeed, it is always better to light a candle than to curse the darkness".

In the Beginning...

The 'Grassroots Programme', better known as GRASSROOTS, was founded against a background of great political instability and social change in the UK and around the world. Rooted in the Christian faith and supported by the Methodist Church and Christian Aid, GRASSROOTS began as a programme of community engagement which also acted as a resource for churches. It encouraged the Church in the UK to engage with liberation theology, thinking about how the Church could be a positive influence for change, and reassessing the meaning and relevance of the Christian faith amidst the struggles of the world.

For founder David Cowling, God is a God who we experience in the 'different', so it was essential that we learn from the perspectives and experiences of people from different backgrounds, whilst also sharing insights from our own. To enable this, GRASSROOTS hosted several Mission Partners (known locally as Project Workers) from all over the world including the Czech Republic, Brazil, Ghana, India, Japan, South Africa and Sri Lanka, who led on projects (some examples follow), including:

- Building Plural Communities in Europe
- Cutting Edge Partnership linking the Church with the community
- Rags & Roses a Community Development Programme in Marsh Farm
- Renewal from the Roots New Ways of Understanding the Bible
- Kairos Europa
- Spirituality, Regeneration & Development
- Justice Spirituality
- Faith in Europe



Rags & Roses was a Community Development Programme in Marsh Farm, a deprived area of Luton, based on



the running of 'Rags & Roses' (a community café), later renamed Café 2000 (pictured above). This was also one of a number of venues for activity groups, presentations and educational talks, including delivery of the Bitesize Programme, led by GRASSROOTS, which sought to encourage adults back into learning. Staff and partners from across Luton and beyond contributed to the delivery of this work, including intercultural, interfaith, arts and crafts, creative writing and environmental activities.



Faith in Europe was delivered with the partnership Institute of Ecumenical Studies in Prague, and with St Anne's Church in Luton. The project focused on the cultural similarities and differences from a Christian perspective of life in a former communist country, compared to that of life in the UK. It sought encourage hetter to of understanding our European neighbours at a time when the EU was expanding greatly. GRASSROOTS also coordinated opportunity for work with communities marginalised presented at the European Parliament.



Kairos Europa was, and continues to be, a network of justice, peace and creation initiatives working in collaboration with ecumenical networks, churches, social movements, trade unions and nongovernmental organisations, both in and outside Europe. The initiative finds its roots in the Kairos process, started in the Anti-Apartheid movement in South Africa in 1985. GRASSROOTS had a coordinating role in addressing the inter cultural and inter faith realities of and exploring local social Europe, economic alternatives, in partnership with a community enterprise.

Cutting Edge Partnership was a theme of work which sought to encourage and enable Churches to respond to challenges in society, share resources and insights, become reflective of the communities they serve, and to offer learning and transformation opportunities for those engaged in community mission.



Global Xchange was a British Council programme hosted by GRASSROOTS for a number of years. Young people from the UK, Indonesia, Philippines, Mongolia, Egypt and Syria visited Luton for learning and cultural exchanges.

Community Faith Development Work

As the needs, resourcing and relevance of projects have inevitably come and gone, further initiatives have been developed and evolved over time into new streams of work. In particular, GRASSROOTS' focus on Community Faith Development Work not only grew, but still continues 25 years later!

First came GRASSROOTS

After GRASSROOTS' formation in 1991, interfaith engagement rapidly grew in importance. In its first five years, relationships were developed with different faith communities, the foundations of trust were built, and new activities were born.

Then **LUTON INTERFAITH FORUM**

In 1996, GRASSROOTS formed a new group called the Luton Interfaith Forum, consisting of different faith communities from across the town. This group started new and exciting themes of work including the 'Inter Faith Pilgrimage', an annual walk between different faith communities to encourage mutual learning and engagement, and to help break down barriers and misunderstanding.

And now LUTON COUNCIL OF FAITHS (LCoF)

Just five years later, as the work of the Luton Interfaith Forum and its membership continued to grow and become increasingly separate from GRASSROOTS, change was needed. In 2001, the Luton Council of Faiths was born (now better known as LCoF), becoming its own independent organisation. However, GRASSROOTS continues to work in close partnership with LCoF on a wide variety of innovative programmes.

Our Work Today

Working with Women Across Faiths and Cultures

This project is concerned with developing recreational, educational and health activities for women, primarily from different faiths and cultural backgrounds, to address their needs, concerns and aspirations. The women are often from sections of the community frequently considered as 'hard to reach'.

The work is largely achieved through partnership with the women's cooperative 'Ghar se Ghar', running various activities including health fayres, Circle Dancing sessions, workshops, day trips and encouraging participation in other events such as Precious Pearls (a celebration of International Women's Day), the Women's World Day of Prayer and the Luton Peace Walk (organised by the partnership of GRASSROOTS and Luton Council of Faiths).



Spirituality of Justice

Through this project, GRASSROOTS seeks to encourage dialogue between people of different cultures and faiths in order to foster a vision of human solidarity, development and the integrity of creation – a movement from dialogue to action for peace and justice. The overall aim of the project is to develop experiences of Justice Spirituality by building compassion and solidarity with and amongst people of different faith traditions in Luton and beyond.



In this, conversations with all people are necessary, along with the need to support each other in the public acknowledgement of faith and cultural festivals, to share the practices and beliefs of different faith traditions, and to show genuine concern for the common good, both locally and globally. The Spirituality of Justice project has led inter faith and ecumenical work around issues of Fair Trade and Trade Justice, and GRASSROOTS leads the award winning multi-faith Luton Fairtrade Steering Group, which succeeded in achieving Fairtrade Town status for Luton in 2011.





Our Work Today

Community Cohesion & Inter Faith Relations

Whilst engaging with people both within and outside the Church, working with people of different faiths, and in partnership with Luton Council of Faiths, GRASSROOTS recognises that engagement across faith and cultural boundaries is not so much a choice, as a necessity. In an increasingly busy world, it is time for 'breaking and sharing the word in action' - with all God's peoples, amongst all God's peoples. Our call to mission is to share our 'God of Love and the Love of God'.



Initiatives under this theme of work include organising peace rallies, vigils and related events in preparation for, and in response to, community cohesion issues arising from various local, national and international events; cultural and faith celebrations, such as Luton Peace Walk, One World Week and Interfaith Week; sports initiatives, including football, cricket and archery competitions; environmental projects such as Faith Woodlands and local legacy projects; and educational events, including the Catalyst Youth Leadership Programme and youth conferences.






Church Related Community Work

The Church Related Community Work (CRCW) project works in partnership with the Bury Park Beech Hill Council of Churches, devising and coordinating a variety of community development initiatives mainly focused on the area of the town in which the churches are located.

CRCW ministry seeks to encourage 'faith in action', enabling the local church to engage with the people and realities in its local community, working together to bring about positive change. In Luton, this has seen the building of new and strengthened relationships across faith and cultural boundaries through a range of social, celebration and arts-focused initiatives, always encouraging the churches to explore more deeply what it means to be a Christian presence 'in this specific place'.

Near Neighbours

GRASSROOTS has been the hub for Near Neighbours since 2014, with the local Coordinator being part of the GRASSROOTS team. Near Neighbours is an initiative of the Church of England's Archbishops Council and the Church Urban Fund and is supported by a multi-faith advisory panel.

A response to the Government's desire to provide resources which are able to strengthen relationships in multi-religious neighbourhoods, Near Neighbours has two key objectives:

Social Interaction:

to develop positive relationships in multifaith areas, i.e. to help people from different faiths get to know and understand each other better.

Social Action:

to encourage people of different faiths and of no faith to come together for initiatives that improve their local neighbourhood.

The work of Near Neighbours is supported by a small grants fund, providing seed funding for local groups and organisations who are working to bring neighbours together, to develop relationships of diverse faiths and ethnicities, and to improve their communities.

As of March 2018, the Luton hub has awarded nearly £500,000 to 170 projects delivered in the town, for initiatives which bring people together locally, are sustainable and involve a diversity of people.



So, What's Next?

In response to the changing needs, challenges and opportunities at both a local and national level, the complex nature of working within the third sector, and the increased difficulties of securing sustainable and sufficient funding at a time of austerity, GRASSROOTS has identified four strategic themes which it hopes to focus on within its key areas of work in the coming years:

Supporting Ecumenism and Engagement within the Church

We wish to advance our work with the Church by hosting visits of ordained and lay people, sharing our experience and best practice through giving talks, delivering bespoke training sessions, facilitating interfaith encounters and developing a published educational resource.

Developing Interfaith and Intercultural Competency

We wish to utilise our unique experience, skills and capabilities to develop bespoke training programmes, consultancy services and engagement opportunities for all sectors, including interfaith tours, visits and other encounters, linking spiritual life with secular life.

Enhancing Regional Support, Influence and Resources

We wish to develop the 'GRASSROOTS Hub', a network which will enable organisations to connect with us, exchange best practice, share knowledge, engage in collaborative activities, identify sources of current research and influence policy at a local and national level.

Reaching People Living on the Fringe of Society

We wish to expand our engagement with those 'living on the fringe' of society, including those from groups seen as 'hard to reach', and place a heightened focus on youth development through continued delivery of our innovative Catalyst Youth Leadership Programme.
